Hello & Wow! Did You See This Year Go By?!



They are also offering "Small Worlds", a companion show of loaned paperweights. Both exhibits run through the May 2019 PCA convention in nearby Dearborn, where we hope you will all join us. The Flint museum is a marvel, and has also just acquired the jaw-dropping "The Glass Glass Collection"! No, that wasn't a typo.

As 2018 draws to a close, we at L.H. Selman are still trying to catch our breath from this year's activities. We were at the January A.G.E. glass show in Las Vegas and the March Oklahoma PCA meeting. In April, we made special trips to the Flint Institute of Arts and of course we exhibited at the classic WheatonArts Paperweight Fest. It was great to see Paul Stankard enjoying himself at his major retrospective there. The museum could barely hold the crowd, which praised the well-designed exhibit that glamorously showcased one of the field's greatest pioneers. Wheaton was also the site of the Johne Parsley memorial melt. It was a spectacular sight in the main studio with Johne's three adult children executing their father's wishes by pouring gleaming molten glass all over scores of beautiful Parsley creations, which he had deemed to be less than perfect (see the rear for pictures of the melt). High standards, indeed!

June saw us down in the Lone Star State for the TXPCA meeting and in September, we hosted our biennial "Celebrate The Paperweight" festival. There were artists and collectors comparing notes, the artists' fair with new designs to offer, drinks and dining, heartfelt presentations on the intersection of art and humanity by artists and educators Pearl Dick (see below) and the Flint's Kathryn Sharbaugh, knockout gift bags, and unusual studio demonstrations. Attendees found the studio session particularly rewarding as CTP highlighted the efforts of Pearl Dick who heads the Project Fire program, funded by Chicago ArtReach. Pearl's program offers hope and hands-on apprenticeships in her glass studio by providing enthusiastic youths the opportunity to develop usable, artistic trade skills and to establish a critical sense of self-respect and community.

The artists who came to Chicago for CTP also went above and beyond in sharing their technical and artistic experience, and their passion for the field with the hopeful students. The 2018 all-star CTP roster included Dave Graeber, Gordon Smith, Damon MacNaught, Andy Najarian, Mayauel Ward, Melissa Ayotte, Cathy Richardson and Ken Rosenfeld. Michael and Sue Hunter and Clinton Smith were unable to travel but were represented by new designs sent for the occasion. And what else could be more appropriate on the eve of the Gallery's 50th anniversary than the attendance of Larry and Marti Selman, who delighted us with their company. In between and overlapping these events were our three auctions, our golden anniversary calendar in your hands, brochures, and a host of other projects and activities, all needing to be dealt with yesterday. Let's all now take a breath and a peek at the year to come...
